January 3, 1934 - August 28, 2014

Jimmie Lee Boring, 80, departed this life Thursday, August 28, 2014. "Big Jim" passed away while surrounded by his family at the Camdenton home he built on the Lake of the Ozarks. Jim was born on January 3rd, 1934, in Coleman, Texas.

Jim leaves behind his loving wife of 63 years, Dorothy, and three children: Linda McCay, Blue Springs, MO; James Boring, Camdenton, MO; and Sandra Frakes, Riverside, MO; as well as five grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.
