Norma June Boeschen, age 84, of Versailles, passed away Saturday, September 24, 2011, at St. Mary's Health Center in Jefferson City. She was born March 26, 1927, in Versailles, the daughter of the late Norman and Clara Bixler Boeschen.

June graduated from Central Missouri State University in Warrensburg with a bachelor's degree in education, and ultimately earned a master's degree.
